## Eric Kraft cooks up another treat

ric Kraft continues his delightful and brainy series of novels about the engaging denizens of the fictional Long Island clamming town of Babbington in his new book, What a Piece of Work I Am (Crown, \$22).

Peter Leroy, the inventive and ever-optimistic protagonist of Kraft's "Where Do You Stop?" and "Little Follies," makes a rou Stop: and Little rolles, makes a return appearance, though his role is ostensibly limited to listening to his wonderfully realized but completely imaginary first love, Ariane Lodkochnikov, as she tells beguiling tales about her life. tells beguiling tales about her life.

Many of her experiences have curious parallels in classic mythology.

Lodkochnikov goes from serving chowder at a clam bar to working as a waitress and maid at Babbington's new Sunrise Cove Resort Motel. Like her near-namesake from Greek mythology, Ari-adne, she, too, finds her dashing Theseus. He takes the form of the motel's handsome manager, Guy.

In another episode, she helps out Le-roy's grandfather and his terminally ill wife. The trio takes a make-believe journey to a tropical paradise, though the trip

often resembles a ride down the river Styx.

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Lodkochnikov's voice is a fetching as can be, by turns tough and wistful. Like Mythology, her vibrant stories show human beings at their worst, their best and their most fragile. And they yield more than a few bits of wisdom.

Above all, Kraft's new novel celebrates the joy of storytelling while gently probing the psyches of those who feel the need to create the stories.
