
## **PICKS OF THE WEEK**

The New York Times picked Eric Kraft's novel What A Piece of Work I Am as a Notable Book of 1994. More important, we loved it here at The Commercial Appeal.

Kraft explores these issues in What a Piece of Work I Am, a joyful and chastening novel in which Ariane Lodkochnikov, called Tootsie Koochikov in school, attempts to rise above her station, her reputation and her small-town life by way of the avantgarde theater; or is it theater, and does Kraft's habitually naive hero Peter Leroy know where life ends and theater begins? He — and we — know one thing; we're all crazy about Tootsie Koochikov, who defines the concept of a dish, a game chick, a blessing.

Last year, we said: "One reacts to the novel on a personal level, delighting in the concreteness of its complexities, the evanescence of its construction and in the playful purposefulness of its prose. Like a mirror held to a mirror, the novel allows us an oblique glimpse of ourselves reflected a thousand times at the oddest angle."

We'll stick with that assessment.
